Setting:

In this play personality and place are forever spinning out of one phase and into another.

The play begins in Henry's Restaurant Café which is more like Henry than you might first suspect. For just as Henry will change into the mycologist Nicholas and then into the astounding Professor Puzzle, so to will the café elasticize into the poet's apartment above, and then balloon into the lab cafeteria, then the YWCA cafetorium and even a combined used clothing store and bookstore.

Director's Notes

Gyroscope is a unique James Reaney play. Parts of it feel like a chamber play (with aesthetic whispers of his early plays like *The Easter Egg*), but it also is full of explosive form busting writing that we associate with his major middle period (*The Donnelly Trilogy*). Gyroscope, written in 1980-1 is a Reaney play unto itself. It is a synthesis of all Reaney had created up to this point. It is also full of ideas and allusions that were fascinating Reaney, there are elements of intimate autobiography and then there are mythic allusions.

Chief of among these allusions is *The Bacchae*; the story of the militaristic King Pentheus who so desires to infiltrate the female bacchanalia that he risks being torn limb to limb. In the world of *Gyroscope* metaphor replaces literal violence and the outcomes are comic, not tragic. We meet characters that we can relate to in a world that we can recognize. Though these characters have one foot (and all of their ego) in the world of the gods.

I choose this play because, while heady, at the play's core is a question that I believe is brilliantly simple and deceptively complex. How do two people fall in love and become something called "each other". What is "each other"? How do we do the hard word to find balance and connection with a person we love? Hilda and Greg struggle with this in the play, their rivalry is born out of a love and desire to understand the other person. This goes as far as taking on the other's habits, interests, even their clothes. It is an ambitious quest in an ambitious play. It is a quest that goes beyond the capacity of language and at some points Reaney uses that often misunderstood 1960s and 70s poetic form, sound poetry. As you sit down to watch this play I invite you to ignite a desire that Hilda and Greg will find balance in their live...and if they can maybe we all can.


About James Reaney

James Reaney, Canadian poet and playwright, was born on a farm near Stratford, Ontario, on September 1, 1926.

He grew up to become one of Canada's bestknown poets and dramatists, enjoying literary success over a period of seven decades. He was also a professor of English at the University of Manitoba (1949-1956) and the University of Western Ontario (1960-1989).

His contributions spanned literary genres, ranging from short stories, poetry, libretti, and drama, to plays and novels for children, along with insightful critical essays on literary practice.

Highly regarded at home and abroad throughout his career, James Reaney's work was recognized with three Governor General's awards, the Chalmers Award for drama, four honorary doctorates and the Order of Canada. He died on June 11, 2008, in London, Ontario.
